## DANZA DOES IT

hen Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners acquires an unnamed horse, typically members of the syndicate's inner circle have the opportunity to add a personal touch.

They can choose a name, said Aron Wellman, president of the ownership group. The eventual choice for Hip 614 at the 2012 Keeneland September yearling sale was rather straightforward.

The pitch from Kelsey Marshall, Eclipse's director of partner relations, was to play off the sire of the chestnut colt (Street Boss), and the star of the hit 1980s sitcom "Who's the Boss" (Tony Danza).

## Danza, at 41-1, surprises in the Arkansas Derby; Will Take Charge keeps charging

"We went with Danza," Wellman said. "Now the horse is famous, too."

Wellman's comment came moments after lightly raced Danza, under a ground-saving ride by Joe Bravo, recorded a stunning victory in the Arkansas Derby (gr. I) April 12 at Oaklawn Park.

With only a maiden victory under his belt, Danza, at odds of 41-1 in his two-turn debut, performed like a seasoned pro with a 4%-length victory over Ride On Curlin.

Before a crowd of 63,186 on a warm, breezy day, Danza provided trainer Todd

Pletcher with a record fourth Arkansas Derby victory and will give Eclipse its first starter in the Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. I) May 3 at Churchill Downs.

"Hopefully, we'll make Arkansas proud in three weeks," Wellman said.

Wellman has been down the Kentucky Derby road before—even if Eclipse hasn't. He spent 3½ years as vice president of Team Valor International before resigning shortly after its Animal Kingdom won the 2011 Kentucky Derby.

Wellman, 36, launched Eclipse, which, like Team Valor, uses a partnership business model, in the summer of 2011.

Danza became the fourth grade I winner for Eclipse, following In Lingerie (Juddmonte Spinster Stakes) in 2012 and Byrama (Vanity Handicap) and Capo Bastone (Foxwoods King's Bishop Stakes) in 2013.

Eclipse had never started a horse at Oaklawn.

"Look, they're all big; they're all important to us at any level," Wellman said. "But, certainly, to come here on Oaklawn's marquee day, win a million-dollar race—this is our first million-dollar race. We did win the King's Bishop last year at Saratoga, which was incredible. But to win such an important Derby prep, it certainly ranks right up there near the top, if not the top."

Eclipse purchased Danza, from the first crop of multiple grade I-winning sprinter Street Boss, for \$105,000. The colt was bred in Kentucky by Rob Whiteley's Liberation Farm and Jim and Pam Robinson's Brandywine Farm.

Danza showed promise last summer, winning his July 12 debut at Belmont Park before finishing third, beaten a (continued on page 42)

## PEDIGREE ANALYSIS & HISTORY

Danza's \$600,000 winner's share of the \$1 million Arkansas Derby (gr. I) purse paid dividends almost six times the \$105,000 that Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners paid for him at the 2012 Keeneland September yearling sale.

The lightly raced colt heads to the Kentucky Derby Presented by Yum! Brands (gr. 1) having made only four starts that include his debut win in July 2013 at Belmont Park followed by a third-place finish in the Saratoga Special Stakes (gr. 11).

Big Brown won the 2008 Derby in his fourth start, and three other horses have won the Derby with just four previous starts: Alan-a-Dale in 1902, Exterminator in 1918, and Animal Kingdom in 2011.

Danza was acquired at Keeneland from breeders Rob Whiteley's Liberation Farm and Jim and Pam Robinson's Brandywine Farm, the latter of which consigned as agent. The partnership also co-bred 2011 Belmont Stakes (gr. 1) winner Ruler On Ice.

With feedback from the Robinsons, Whiteley plans the matings for the mares they own together, and the Robinsons handle the foaling, raising, and sales prep at their Paris, Ky., farm.

Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners, which forms racing partnerships and saw its first runners hit the track just 18 months ago, is led by Aron Wellman, who was an executive with Team Valor International when Animal Kingdom won the Derby.

After his Keeneland purchase Danza spent the winter under the guidance of trainer Todd Pletcher's father, J.J. Pletcher, at Payton Training Center near Ocala, Fla. He joined the trainer's New York stable in the spring of 2013.

Danza is from the second crop of multiple grade I-winning sprinter Street Boss.

His dam is the French Deputy mare Champagne Royale, who won twice at 11/16 miles and finished second at the distance in a listed stakes, all at Hastings Racecourse. Brandywine bought her for \$29,000 from James Keogh, agent, at the 2006 Keeneland January horses of all ages sale. Danza is her fifth foal and one of four winners from as many starters, including a Rockport Harbor half brother, Majestic Harbor, who won the 11/2-mile Tokyo City Cup Stakes (gr. III) March 29 at Santa Anita Park

Danza's second dam, All Tanked Up, is a winning daughter of 1985 Arkansas Derby winner and Preakness Stakes (gr. 1) victor Tank's Prospect.

Danza is the second grade I winner for Street Boss, the other being Eclipse Thoroughbred Partners' sprinter Capo Bastone from the first crop. The 10-year-old son of Street Cry stands for a 2014 fee of \$10,000 at Darley near Lexington.—M.L.

half-length, in the \$200,000 Saratoga Special Stakes (gr. II) Aug. 11 at Saratoga.

"He's a colt that we've always thought a lot of," Pletcher said. "I think if you look at his form, he's never run anything but good races."

Danza didn't race again at 2 after coming out of the Saratoga Special with a "little issue," Wellman said, referring to a knee.

The colt resurfaced March 1 at Gulfstream Park in an entry-level allowance/ optional claimer at seven furlongs.

In what would be his audition for the Arkansas Derby, Danza finished third, beaten 7½ lengths.

Wellman and Pletcher, however, called Danza's performance "sneaky good" because he was racing against a track bias.

"In the back of our minds, we were always kind of thinking, 'OK, well, we're

\$750,000 Toyota Blue Grass Stakes (gr. I) the same afternoon at Keeneland.

"Just seemed like the more we put things together, the more it seemed like the Arkansas Derby was the race for us to step out and take our shot in," Pletcher said.

Danza delivered.

Pressed by longshot Thundergram, unbeaten Bayern—the 8-5 favorite following two blowout victories earlier this year at Santa Anita—towed the eighthorse field through moderate fractions of :23.72 for the opening quarter and :47.71 for a half-mile.

Bayern and Thundergram had battled through three-quarters in 1:12.29 when Bravo began pushing on Danza near the three-furlong marker.

Danza, in third, quickly erased a two-length deficit and slipped through an opening along the rail turning for

going to have one chance at a Derby prep," Wellman said. "And we got the race into him down at Gulfstream going seven-eighths. It was a time of the meet when speed was virtually impossible to beat, and he prefers to come from a little bit out of it."

Within an hour after the race, Wellman said he and Pletcher were on the phone discussing where they would take their "big swing" with Danza—provided he trained well in the ensuing weeks.

Following four half-mile workouts at Palm Meadows Training Center in South Florida, the last coming April 6, Danza was flown to Arkansas. Pletcher opted for the Arkansas Derby over the home, inside a leg-weary Bayern and Thundergram.

"It was textbook, just textbook," said Bravo, who was riding the colt for the first time. "Everything unfolded like a dream. That was pretty cool down the lane. It's really fun to have a special horse like that and have him run like that."

Danza opened a 1½-length advantage in midstretch and continued to pull away in the final furlong under steady handling.

Carrying 118 pounds, he ran the 1½ miles over a fast track in 1:49.68. The final time was just .13 slower than champion Will Take Charge had needed to win the Oaklawn Handicap (gr. II) for older

horses 50 minutes earlier.

"He's been under the radar," Wellman said. "After he ran his bang-up third in the Saratoga Special, I think, he came on to the scene. He earned respect right there and then. But as a lot of 2-year-olds will do that go to the sidelines after that, they kind of fall by the wayside and get overlooked."

Wellman credited another member of Pletcher's family, his father J.J., for having Danza ready to excel in the biggest race of his young career.

Danza rehabbed at Pletcher's Payton Training Center near Ocala, Fla., before returning to Todd Pletcher's barn in December.

J.J. Pletcher—as a trainer—also won races in Hot Springs, notably the 1980 Oaklawn Handicap with Uncool.

The younger Pletcher, honored a record six times with an Eclipse Award as the nation's top trainer, has won each of Oaklawn's four biggest season-ending races (Arkansas Derby, Apple Blossom Handicap, Oaklawn Handicap, and Fantasy Stakes) at least once.

"Always happy to win there," said Pletcher, who wasn't in attendance for Danza's victory. "It's a favorite track of mine. My dad raced there when I was a teenager, and I have a lot of fond memories of Oaklawn."

Charging Down the Stretch

Will Take Charge needed a little less than two minutes to cross the wire first in the \$600,000 Oaklawn Handicap for older horses, but last year's champion 3-year-old male had to wait about 10 minutes before being declared the official winner.

Will Take Charge, the 2-5 favorite under regular rider Luis Saez, survived a lengthy stewards' inquiry and two foul claims to capture the race by threequarters of a length over an unlucky Revolutionary.

"I didn't see that much of a problem," said Willis Horton of Marshall, Ark., Will Take Charge's colorful co-owner. "I feel better than I did before the race."

Will Take Charge surged to the lead on the outside in midstretch but drifted in under right-handed urging to bother a tiring Golden Lad, then Revolutionary, who was searching for a seam between horses.

After finding a clear path approaching the sixteenth pole, Revolutionary closed strongly but ran out of time under Mike

Smith.

Both Gary Stevens, the rider of Golden Lad, and Smith claimed foul against Will Take Charge.

"It was a 50-50 call, and I understand that," Smith said. "It was a judgment call, and it just didn't go my way."

Will Take Charge ran 1% miles over a fast track in 1:49.55. He carried top weight of 123 pounds. Revolutionary carried 117.

Will Take Charge, a flashy chestnut son of Unbridled's Song-Take Charge Lady, by Dehere, began his rise to national prominence with victories in last year's Smarty Jones Stakes and Rebel Stakes (gr. II) at Oaklawn, where he has been based the last two winters with Hall of Fame trainer D. Wayne Lukas.

A \$425,000 Keeneland September yearling sale graduate, Will Take Charge has bankrolled \$3,665,148 off seven victories in 18 starts. The colt was bred in Kentucky by Eaton and is co-owned by Three Chimneys Farm.

## Hatching Another Gr. I

The country's older female division appears stacked this year, and Juddmonte Farms' Close Hatches figures to be one of its major players.

Close Hatches padded an already sterling résumé with a front-running 11/4-length victory in the \$588,000 Apple Blossom Handicap (gr. I) April 11.

"We had been pointing for this race for hree months," Hall of Fame trainer Bill Mott said. "It's always nice when a plan comes together."

The Apple Blossom, the seventh victory in 10 lifetime starts for Close Hatches, increased her earnings to \$1,847,300. She was a two-time grade I winner last year for Prince Khalid Abdullah's Juddmonte operation.

Close Hatches is a 4-year-old daughter of First Defence, who stands at Juddmonte Farms near Lexington. Close Hatches was bred by Abdullah's Millsec subsidiary.

"She was from the first crop of First Defence, so we were obviously paying close attention to what they all looked like," said Garrett O'Rourke, Juddmonte's farm manager. "She was always the star of his first crop. I'm glad to say she's got a full sister born this year, a foal who's like a clone of her. Hopefully, she can run half as good as her. She was always pretty special."

The Apple Blossom was a virtual repeat of the March 15 Azeri Stakes (gr. II)—the final major local prep—when Close Hatches, again breaking from the rail, grabbed the lead and controlled the pace from the outset under Joel Rosario.

Defending Apple Blossom champion On Fire Baby, who chased Close Hatches from the start, finished second. Under top weight of 121 pounds, Close Hatches covered 11/16 miles over a fast track in 1:42.75. She was the 7-10 favorite.

Following his record fourth Apple Blossom victory, Mott said Close Hatches will be pointed to the \$1 million Ogden Phipps Stakes (gr. I) June 7 at Belmont Park. The race is also expected to lure two-time champion Beholder and multiple grade I winner Princess of Sylmar.

Beholder and Close Hatches ran 1-2 in last year's \$2 million Breeders' Cup Distaff (gr. I), while Princess of Sylmar was last of six after stumbling at the start.

"I'm sure the Phipps, having a milliondollar pot, will nearly be like a Breeders' Cup race," Mott said. "I'm sure everybody with a good one is going to show up."

Beholder, Princess of Sylmar, and Close Hatches were 2013 finalists for an Eclipse Award as the country's 3-yearold filly champion. BH
